REFLECTION

Jesus brings these words in his farewell discourse, addressing two main issues that have attracted my attention.

The first one is that of community. "That they may be one, as you and I are one." Jesus equates human relationship to that of the Trinity. The Godhead is pointed as the model. A few reminders; first, they are all eternal; no beginning, no end. Jesus asserts that they are equal in power/authority and they are of the same substance. That means none of them is superior than the other. Trinity; as we know or at least it has been understood to be, does not compete, oppress one another, exploit one another, or deny each other space.

Thus, we are called into a relationship of mutual respect, not only with our peers, but even with contra-minded individuals, (not adversaries). We are called to be one, in our diversity. That may mean sticking together even if some of the things are not at their best. A family member doesn't easily walk out for the mere reason that things aren't working as they are desired. That asks for patience, perseverance, long suffering and resilience. Moses, Aaron & Miriam demonstrated to us how a family can effectively serve you.

The Second aspect is that of being in the world, remaining in the world and being send into the world. The community of Jesus' followers are not exclusively "a holy club, that has nothing to do with their community.' They are not called to live a pious life that has nothing to do with community. In fact; they are to remain in the world, a people called for and are sent into the world. Therefore, it is not the intention of Jesus to have a church that focuses on their holiness only. There is a tendency for many Christians to stay separated from the society because they are holy. From this passage or pericopi, Jesus is very intentional. The followers of Jesus, by all intent & purposes, should exist and live for the world. The question is; "Who is the world?" I think that includes everybody and everyone.

The Quality of Our Relationship with God Determines Our Relationship with One Another

In this relationship with our creator, we should treat our neighbor as ourselves. Mark 12:30-31. Loving our neighbor is key to our life as a family of faith. Love is so central in our lives as families, more than any other value or principle. It builds more homes, heals wounded and broken hearts, reaches out unconditionally, accepts without judging, calls forth the divine in the other a prophetic way, and so forth. In this passage, Jesus used himself as the model. We are not called to invent other models, as followers of Jesus, although we can find other models in life. In my opinion, love has the traction and it facilitates how all other virtues might be seen.

On this Family day, remember Simon & Andrew – two greatest brothers in the apostolic succession – Peter in the western church & Andrew in the Eastern Church, Naomi & Ruth – a multi-racial family, Mary & Martha crying for their brother/sibling Lazarus. Sometimes family comes with tension as it did with Jacob & Esau, yet they represent family. How does our faith shape our relations? How can we build a better community? Jesus offers some of the approaches that might help us. What do you think we need to do?

What role are you prepared to take in building your family, our church family and the whole creation, as a family? Sometimes we need peace makers, listeners, encouragers like Barnabas, leaders like Moses, givers like Dorcas, or whatever and whoever you may want to refer. Pick and choose how you want to contribute in building a better family at all levels of our society.
